- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. 
It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA)

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

This year, Upper Key Stage Two has moved away from RealPE and taught a hybrid approach to PE. The sport-based skills that have been taught have been linked to competition calendars (SGO, NSSPA and Forge Trust). These skills have also been cross referenced with the RealPE curriculum ensuring that the features/skills from RealPE are used and the platform that supports teachers is still being used. What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 meters?	76.5%	No challenges faced, children attended sessions at Newark Sports and Fitness Centre.
